**With Special Reference to His Role as a Mentor, Philanthropist, and Inspiration to the Visually Impaired**

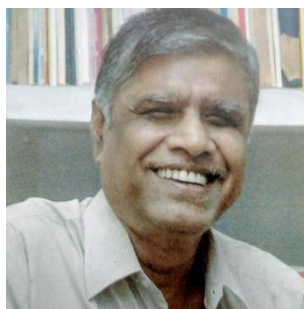

Dr. Muniratnam Jakkampudi (1948–2026) stands as an extraordinary figure in Indian academia, whose life and work exemplify the confluence of scholarship, resilience, and social commitment. Born blind in Kaverirajapuram village, Tiruttani Taluk, Tiruvallur District, Tamil Nadu, he overcame significant challenges to emerge as a distinguished scholar in Telugu literature and comparative studies. This paper presents a critical study of his academic contributions, particularly in Telugu–Tamil comparative literature, along with an analysis of his pedagogical influence and social service. It highlights his research outputs, including books, translations, and UGC-funded projects, as well as his mentorship of research scholars. The study also foregrounds his inspirational role for the visually impaired community and his humanitarian engagement in supporting underprivileged students. By examining his life and legacy, the paper underscores how intellectual excellence can harmoniously coexist with compassion and social responsibility.

Dr. Muniratnam Jakkampudi represents such a rare synthesis of scholarship and service. Born blind in 1948 in Kaverirajapuram village, Tiruttani Taluk, Tiruvallur District, Tamil Nadu, he overcame structural and personal challenges to emerge as a distinguished academician.

This paper critically examines his contributions to Telugu–Tamil comparative literature, his pedagogical influence, and his humanitarian engagements. It also situates his life within the broader discourse of inclusive education and resilience.

**Early Life and Educational Achievements:**

Dr. Muniratnam's early life was marked by visual impairment, yet supported by strong familial encouragement, particularly his father Sri Jakkampudi Muniswamy naidu, mother Smt Narasamma. His father played a pivotal role by serving as his scribe during examinations, enabling him to pursue formal education.

He completed his Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, and Doctor of Philosophy in Telugu from Sri Venkateswara University, Tirupati. His doctoral research, Annamaiyya Alwars – A Comparative Study, reflects his early engagement with inter-literary traditions.

**Notably, he accomplished his entire education without knowledge of Braille, relying instead on auditory learning and memory-based cognition, which underscores his exceptional intellectual discipline.**

### **Academic Career and Institutional Contributions:**

Dr. Muniratnam Sir began his academic career in 1987 as a Research Associate at Sri Venkateswara University. His scholarly acumen and dedication soon led to successive promotions—first as Lecturer, then Reader, and ultimately Professor. His career progression was not merely administrative but reflective of his deep engagement with teaching, research, and mentorship.

Over the course of his academic tenure, which concluded with his superannuation in 2008, he made substantial contributions to Telugu and comparative literature. His teaching was known for its depth, clarity, and inspirational quality. Students and colleagues alike admired his ability to internalize vast bodies of knowledge and articulate them with precision.

As a Member of the Board of Studies at Sri Venkateswara University, he played a significant role in shaping academic curricula and promoting interdisciplinary approaches, particularly in the comparative study of Telugu and Tamil literature.

### **Contributions to Telugu-Tamil Comparative Literature through UGC-Funded Research Projects:**

Dr. Muniratnam's academic contributions are both extensive and impactful. He successfully completed two major projects funded by the University Grants Commission (UGC):

Another significant observation from the recording is his student-centered pedagogical approach. His interaction reflects patience, accessibility, and a genuine concern for learners' understanding. Rather than adopting a purely didactic mode, he appears to engage students in a manner that encourages reflection and intellectual participation.

The recording also highlights his simplicity, humility, and disciplined demeanor, qualities that align with the classical Indian ideal of a teacher-scholar. Importantly, it reinforces his identity as a model of functional independence despite visual impairment, demonstrating confidence, clarity of thought, and effective communication.

Thus, the video serves not only as documentation but also as an important pedagogical and inspirational resource, complementing written academic records and enriching the understanding of his legacy.
